


Washington, D.C., is the capital of the United States. It is located between Virginia and Maryland on the Potomac River. Washington, D.C., is also the headquarters of the federal government.

This incredible city is a symbol of United States history and the home of many of the country's important historical landmarks.

Many of Washington, D.C.'s, famous landmarks are located on the National Mall. The Mall is a long, narrow, parklike area with large open spaces in the middle of the city. It is home to the White House, and the U.S. Capitol, where Congress meets. The Mall is also dedicated to honoring the history of the United States. Memorials for presidents George Washington, Abraham Lincoln, Thomas Jefferson, and Franklin D. Roosevelt can all be found on the Mall. There are also memorials honoring Americans who fought in the Korean and Vietnam Wars.

Details in a story give information about the main idea and help the reader better understand the story.



Near the Lincoln Memorial is another memorial. It is the National World War II Memorial. This memorial honors Americans who fought and supported the United States during World War II. The U.S. fought in this war from 1941 to 1945. The memorial features a Rainbow Pool, two giant arches, a ring of stone columns, and a wall covered with gold stars. Each star represents 100 Americans who died while fighting in World War II.

Bob Dole, a former senator and World War II veteran, worked tirelessly to get this memorial built. He said that the memorial would remind Americans of the value of freedom. "Freedom is not free," says Dole. "It must be earned . . ."

More than \$190 million was raised to build the memorial. Many businesses, private groups, and schools donated money to this cause. The memorial was completed in 2004.





America's First People

Native Americans lived in North and South America long before

Europeans arrived. Their many tribal nations were spread

throughout the two continents. The cultures, languages, and ways
of life often differed by region. For example, the Indigenous
peoples in the woodlands along the eastern coast of North America had a very different lifestyle

than those who lived in the drier areas of the southwest.

To compare and contrast ideas in a passage, determine how the ideas are alike and how they are different.

The woodland nations inhabited the eastern half of what is now the United States. Their lands stretched from what is now the Canadian border in the north to the Gulf Coast in the south. They also extended east and west from the Atlantic Ocean all the way to the Mississippi River. The northern parts of this area had cold winters, but the whole region had warm summers. The Haudenosaunee, Wampanoag, Cherokee, and Chickasaw are just a few of the many tribal nations that lived in the east.

The Indigenous people of the southwest lived in a warm and dry region that covered a large area of the continent, which now makes up Arizona, New Mexico, southern Colorado, and northern Mexico. These areas were home to many tribal nations such as the Apache, Navajo (Diné), and Pueblo.

Housing was very different in these two different regions. Those in the east built a variety of homes, depending on their location. Northeastern nations lived in dome-shaped wigwams covered with sheets of bark or in longhouses. A longhouse was a large, rectangular shelter that was home to several related families, each living in its own section. Southeastern nations often built villages around a central public square where community events took place.

Southwestern nations lived in cliff houses or large, many-storied homes built from rock and a mud-like substance called adobe. These adobe dwellings could house many families.

Although there were many differences between the southwestern and eastern tribal nations, they both ate a lot of corn, beans, and squash. Hunting was important in both regions, although fishing was more significant in the east.




The tribal nations in both regions were excellent craftspeople. Those in the east made pottery, wicker baskets, and deerskin clothing. Those in the southwest made pottery, too. They were also skilled at spinning cotton and weaving it into cloth. This cloth was made into clothing.

Life for the Indigenous peoples of the eastern woodland and of the southwest may be different today than it was in the past, but learning about their incredible history is important.



Do-It-Yourself Lava Lamp

Lava lamps first made their appearance as a novelty item in 1963. They didn't contain actual boiling lava from an active volcano, but the liquid inside did move in much the same slow, burbling manner as lava does as it inches along. Now, you can make your own lava lamp with simple materials you probably already have at home.




Materials

- funnel
- empty 16-oz. clear plastic water bottle with screw-on cap
- 10 oz. vegetable oil
- tap water
- food coloring in a dark color
- 1 large antacid tablet

Step-by-Step Instructions

- Place the funnel in the bottle. Pour the oil into the funnel. Then add water until the bottle is almost full. Leave a little bit of space.
- 2. Add 12 drops of food coloring. Swirl gently to mix.
- 3. Break the antacid tablet into eight small pieces.

 Drop one piece of the tablet into the liquid. It will begin bubbling. When the bubbling stops, add another piece. Again, wait until the bubbling stops. Repeat until you use all the pieces.
- 4. When the bubbling finally stops, screw the top onto the bottle. Slowly tilt the bottle from side to side. Look for the blobby lava waves!





Parts of a Paragraph

A paragraph is a group of sentences that tells about one main idea. The topic sentence tells the main idea and is usually the first sentence. Supporting sentences tell more about the main idea. The closing sentence of a paragraph often retells the main idea in a different way. Here are the parts for one paragraph.
